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## **Highlights in 2003–2004**

UBC's School of Community and Regional Planning (SCARP) is one of Canada's largest and oldest graduate planning programs, with a 50-year heritage in graduate planning education, capacity building, research, and service. The school is focused on participatory planning for environmental, social, and economic sustainability. SCARP has the equivalent of 15 faculty, over 100 students in residence, and a teaching program. SCARP is also home to the Centre for Human Settlements, which leads major collaborative programs focused on community-based planning for poverty reduction in Brazil, Vietnam, and other Asian countries.

Over the past year, 121 master's and 14 doctoral students enrolled in UBC's program in Community and Regional Planning program (SCARP), as the school continued to rebuild its expertise in conjunction with ongoing faculty appointments. Over the same period, 23 master's students graduated from the program.

In June 2003, SCARP hosted the inaugural North American Planning Doctoral Student Jamboree, which brought together 30 doctoral students from major schools in Canada and the U.S. with two internationally recognized academics (Anastasia Loukaitou-Sideris from UCLA and Bent Flyvbjerg from Aalborg University, Denmark).

The program also developed notable course offerings: land use transportation and non-motorized transportation (Larry Frank), regional planning (Doug Aberley), social planning (Kari Huhtala), urban design history and theory (Michael Larice), and economic evaluation techniques for planning (Eric Vance).

Again this year, community-based courses made significant contributions to ongoing planning processes on campus, across the province, and internationally in Seattle and China.

Major efforts also went into preparing for January's five-year site visit and program review by the U.S. Planning Accreditation Board. In their draft report, the site visit team summarized their conclusions as follows: 'The School of Community and Regional Planning is a program positioned for excellence that has made tremendous progress in the last five years.'

### **Highlights**

New faculty appointments included Stephanie Chang (Canada Research Chair in Urban Sustainability and Disaster Management), Larry Frank (Bombardier Chair in Sustainable Transportation), and Michael Larice (urban design)

Publishing activity at the school was brisk, with at least five faculty members involved with book or journal launches, and two faculty members completing manuscripts

Peter Boothroyd was awarded the Vietnam Friendship Medal in recognition of his contributions over a decade of work

Penny Gurstein's book *Wired to the World, Chained to the Home: Telework in Daily Life*, was short-listed for Canadian Women's Studies Book Prize

Eco-Footprint Analysis – pioneered by the school’s Dr. Bill Rees – received world-wide attention with speaking dates in North America, Europe, Australia and Asia, and was supported by three new research grants

SCARP also developed a successful proposal to recruit Dr. Abidin Kusno as a Canada Research Chair in Asian Urbanism and Culture. The added expertise will enhance opportunities for students interested in development planning

### **Vision**

Over the coming year SCARP will review its curriculum and revise its strategic plan in order to capitalize on new gains in faculty expertise, and to respond to suggestions from January’s Planning Accreditation Board report and upcoming five-year accreditation review by the Canadian Institute of Planners.

Dr. Joseph Berechman, the first appointee to the CN Chair in Transportation, will join the school in September in a joint appointment with UBC’s Sauder School of Business. In the next 12 months the school’s four ICT ‘collaboratories’ will become operational: urban design (Michael Larice), participatory planning (Leonie Sandercock), disaster management (Stephanie Chang), and transportation (Larry Frank).

### **School of Community and Regional Planning Scholarships**

### **The Emergence of a New Global Division of Labour in Information Work: What is Canada's Place?**

By Ursula Huws – September 18<sup>th</sup>, 2003

Rarely is the hyperbole surrounding New Economy work supported by empirical research that investigate the trends. Ursula Huws and a team of researchers in the EU, Australia, Asia, and now Canada, are uncovering significant data that reveals globally the local manifestations of the impact of e-work, labour that involves processing information that can be transmitted by a telecommunications link. Her lecture outlined the issues uncovered by the global EMERGENCE (Estimation and Mapping of Employment Relocation in a Global Economy in the New Communications Environment) project and discussed the implications for Canada. Her lecture was sponsored by a recently funded SSRHC INE (Initiative on the New Economy) project, “Canadian EMERGENCE: A Study of Employment Relocation in the Global Economy” directed by Penny Gurstein, Professor in the School of Community and Regional Planning, UBC.

### **Public Deliberation in an Adversarial World**

A forum with John Forrester – November 27<sup>th</sup>, 2003

This one-day dialogue forum brought together urban and regional planners, community activists, government officials and others concerned with the question “What should planners and other public decision-makers know about inclusive and effective decision-making processes?” The forum addressed questions concerning the quality of local participation in public deliberation and the necessary pragmatic skill and political vision required of all participants in such processes. The forum explored how planners and other convenors and participants of public deliberation talk about the problems and challenges they face and what can be learned from the diverse perspectives of stakeholders involved.

In the highly complex context of public planning policy – whether concerned with the environment, transportation, public housing, education or health – John Forrester’s work on practical judgment and how practitioners learn from each other offers a new way to see old debates. John Forrester opened dialogue by drawing from the accounts of diverse planners and political theory to set the context and offer some conceptual lenses for understanding practical problems and opportunities for dialogue and deliberation. Throughout the day John Forrester, key respondents and forum participants engaged with the ideas, concepts and the specific local regional issues in British Columbia that have relevance and application in a variety of contexts.

## **Newsbytes: Newsletter of the SCARP Community**

The first issue of SCARP’s on-line newsletter was published in the Fall of 2000. Since that time, twelve issues have been published, in November, January and March of each year. The

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newsletter brings students, alumni, staff, faculty and other members of the SCARP community up-to-date on news and events in the School.

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## Centre for Human Settlements

The Centre for Human Settlements (CHS) takes as its mission “to advance knowledge of the dynamics of, and effective methods for, democratically planning the sustainable development of settlements.” The interdisciplinary research and capacity-building programs at CHS address a multiplicity of complex community development issues. In collaboration with academic, governmental and NGO partners, CHS advances knowledge through participatory action research, field tests of proposed planning methods, institutional capacity building, and mutual learning.

CHS has an established record of research in planning for sustainable development that explores local and global paths towards achieving it. In 1991, CHS was designated an International Centre of Excellence in International Development by the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA). Since then, the Centre has been awarded four other major CIDA grants; funding from the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) for a training program on planning for sustainability in Hanoi, Vietnam; and funding from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) to initiate an international gender and development network.

Under the CHS umbrella, the Disaster Preparedness Resource Centre (DPRC) has been successful in obtaining funding for a variety of research and training projects and conferences. Faculty Associates have also been active in individual research projects funded by a broad spectrum of national and international funding agencies. Current projects are summarized below.

### Brazil

#### Community Based Watershed Management in Santo André

Project Director, Peter Boothroyd; Project Coordinator, Erika de Castro

The Community Based Watershed Management (CBWM) project is a four-year CIDA-funded project that started in October 1998. Santo André is one of thirty-nine municipalities in the Sao Paulo Metropolitan Area (SPMA), the second largest city in Latin America. Sixty percent of the municipality is located in reserve areas that were established to preserve watersheds, green areas and natural parks. The metropolitan urban expansion has been a continuous source of pressure to increase the number of people living in the WPA, and so increasingly threatening the water quality of the metropolitan watersheds. The project has been undertaken to proactively address issues arising from human settlement in environmentally sensitive areas. The need to integrate informal and irregular settlements effectively into the urban system is the primary issue. The purposes of this project are:

1. To introduce Community-Based Watershed Management (CBWM) methods to Watershed Protection Areas in Santo André, with applicability to other communities and municipalities.
  2. To improve the quality and availability of information necessary for municipal decision-making related to watershed management.
  3. To expand institutional linkages between Canada and Brazil
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**Highlights of the CBWM project during the past year are as follows:**

***CBWM Project Extension to January 31, 2004***

The 2002-03 annual work plan, developed at strategic planning meetings between the Brazilian team members and the Canadian co-ordinator, drew on lessons learned from the first few years of the project and set forth measures to improve, change and intensify ongoing activities. Particularly noteworthy were new activities related to community economic development (CED), women's participation, and community empowerment. These activities continued through the 2003-2004 project year.

An assessment of the lessons to be learned from the CBWM project was conducted by external consultants in September 2003. The Lessons Learned Symposium, organised by CIDA in Ottawa in October 2003 provided an opportunity to share experiences with principals in other CIDA projects in Brazil. In February of 2004, in Vancouver, a project self-evaluation seminar was held to analyze the implications of the project for future Canadian-Brazilian co-operation.

Other important events promoted and supported by the project in 2003-04 included: the "Community Economic Development Workshop – a Regional Approach"; the conference on "Fishing in the ABC-Billings Reservoir: New Approaches for Amateur Fishing"; the "First Youth Municipal Conference"; the exposition entitled "First Small Entrepreneurs Exposition in Pintassilgo," which was later followed by "Travessa Pintassilgo: Second Small Entrepreneurs Exposition"; the official inauguration of Pintassilgo's Community Cultural Space; the internationally attended presentation of "Pintassilgo Amanha" Pintassilgo's new youth group of Theatre of the Oppressed; the women community leaders CBWM project evaluation day and CBWM Community Quilt kick-off workshop; and the conference on public policies for the promotion of women's equality, "Verde Lilas."

***Purposes and Anticipated Outcomes***

The project purposes and their related anticipated outcomes, as stated in the original proposal, were:

To introduce Community-Based Watershed Management (CBWM) methods in Watershed Protection Areas in Santo André, with application to other communities and municipalities

Expected Overall Outcome: more integrated and participatory plans, policies and planning processes in Santo André's Watershed Area and beyond.

Three specific outcomes related to this purpose were anticipated:

A strategy to introduce CBWM methods agreed upon by municipal government, key stakeholders and, particularly, local communities and women's groups;

A mutually agreed upon process established for regular communication and conflict management between the municipal government and key stakeholders regarding watershed management;

Increased collaboration and consultation among key Brazilian public and private institutions on the promotion of community-based watershed management in the São Paulo region.

To improve the quality and availability of information necessary for municipal decision making related to watershed management

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Expected Outcome: improvement in the ability of key stakeholders to analyse municipal planning options and their impacts

To expand institutional linkages between Canada and Brazil

Expected Outcome: establishment and reinforcement of institutional partnerships between Canadian and Brazilian universities, municipalities, NGOs, and community groups

## **British Columbia**

### ***EMERGENCE Canada (Estimation and Mapping of Employment Relocation in a Global Economy in the New Communications Environment): A Study of Employment Relocation in the Global Economy***

Principal Investigator: Penny Gurstein; Co-Investigators: Ursula Huws, Analytica Social and Economic Research, Ruth Buchanan, UBC Faculty of Law, and Laura Johnson, University of Waterloo School of Planning

On March 17, 2003, the SSHRC INE (Initiative on the New Economy) program provided funding of \$253,000 for this three-year research project which links with the European Union and Australian-funded EMERGENCE Projects (Website: [www.emergence.nu](http://www.emergence.nu)). The EMERGENCE Canada ([www.chs.ubc.ca/emergence/](http://www.chs.ubc.ca/emergence/)) project examines the outsourcing of telemediated employment between firms within Canada and between Canada and Asia, and possibly Latin America, and compares these practices to ones in Australia and the EU. Telemediated or 'e-work' refers to labour that involves processing information that can be transmitted by a telecommunications link.

In September 2003 an inaugural workshop, "Work, Information Technology and Restructuring in the Canadian Context," was organized to bring Canadian and international researchers together to develop a conceptual framework for the project. In addition in Year 1 of the project, the research instrument was developed and tested, case studies were identified, data collection began and the website to disseminate findings was created. The primary method that is employed by the Canadian EMERGENCE project is in-depth case studies modeled on a survey technique utilized in the EU, Asian and Australian EMERGENCE projects. In Phase 1 of the project two case studies of Vancouver firms were done, one that is a destination of outsourcing activities from the US and one that outsources or relocates activities to information technology and communication companies in Asia. The Phase 1 studies refined EMERGENCE survey techniques to enhance their utility in the Canadian context and gather preliminary data that will be used to identify the most appropriate Canadian locations for further case studies in Phase 2. Phase 2 will capitalize on the findings and team building from Phase 1 to conduct case studies of Canadian firms that outsource activities to companies or relocate their own activities both within Canada and abroad, giving particular attention to outsourcing or relocating to Pacific Rim nations.

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**Government Responses to Poverty and Income Inequality and their Effects on Children and Families (a collaborative study within The CHILD Project: Building a Consortium for Health, Intervention, Learning and Development in a Community Setting)**

Principal Investigator: Penny Gurstein; Co-Investigators: Jo-Anne Fiske, First Nations Studies, UNBC, and Jane Pulkingham, Sociology/Anthropology, SFU

This Income assistance project ([www.earlylearning.ubc.ca/CHILD/research\\_child\\_poverty.htm](http://www.earlylearning.ubc.ca/CHILD/research_child_poverty.htm)) has received funding of \$322,000 for a 5-year study within the larger, SSHRC MCRI-funded grant for the CHILD (Consortium for Health, Intervention, Learning and Development) Project. Ethical Approval for this study was received on June 13, 2003.

Despite a relatively strong economy, a significant minority of Canadians, about 1 in 10 working age households, are being left behind in deep and continuing poverty and mounting income inequality. Their ranks disproportionately include single parent families (primarily lone mothers), some recent immigrants, persons with disabilities and aboriginal Canadians. This project focuses on an understanding of the experience of children and families in these circumstances in British Columbia, and especially the experiences of families who are currently undergoing reductions in income security, child care, employment standards, access to justice and other supports to families. The project tracks 30 families from urban and rural locales over three years to understand the impact that social policies play in poor people's lives.

We argue for poverty studies that do not demonize the poor and place them in categories of "deserving" and "undeserving." Rather, research needs to seek to understand the underlying causes of poverty and demystify the experiences of the poor so that appropriate policy initiatives can be formulated. Research on poverty mainly looks at aggregate data. Relatively few studies investigate the experiences of poverty on a qualitative basis. This study intends to provide a multi-methods perspective on this issue by both researching the large quantitative indicators of poverty and the qualitative life stories. This research will help frame the policy context for interventions to improve the lives of children at risk.

This study occurs in two sites: urban (Vancouver, the northeast section covered by Main-Renfrew; Broadway-Waterfront) and rural/remote (Bulkley Valley—the area centred around Smithers covering Hazelton to the west and Huston to the east). The selection of an urban and rural community is based on the assumption that the effects are likely to be different given the economic restructuring and the sense that there is a growing urban-rural divide. North-East Vancouver has a high concentration of lone mothers on Income Assistance and this should make it easier to recruit/select lone mothers for interviews, while the Bulkley Valley has been clearly impacted through loss of public sector jobs.

**New Service Economy of the Inner City: An International Comparative Study**

Principal Investigator: Thomas A. Hutton

On January 15, 2002, SSHRC awarded a development grant of \$32,515 under its Initiative on the New Economy Program for this research project which addresses fundamental issues concerning the critical spatial dimensions of the new economy and, more specifically, the role played by the inner city in hosting design, technology-based, and design/technology 'hybrid' firms. These firm clusters, located in response to the unique urban, economic and socio-cultural agglomeration attributes of inner city terrains, typify new urban development trajectories in the 21<sup>st</sup> century and constitute essential features of the 'new economy' in Canada and other advanced societies.

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This project extended current work on cluster-driven urban development in Canada to offer a comparative study of selected inner city sites in five cities at different levels of the global urban hierarchy: London, Singapore, San Francisco, Seattle and Vancouver. Field work was completed in January 2003. This research resulted in (1) the submission of a journal article to *Cities* (in press for the January 2004 issue): “The New Economy of the Inner City: Processes, Patterns, and Planning Issues,” and (2) the submission of a book prospectus to Oxford University Press in February 2003: *The New Economy of the Inner City: Innovation, Transformation, and Dislocation in the Metropolitan Core*.

### **Exploratory Workshop—Service Industries and New Models of Urban Change within the Asia-Pacific**

Principal Investigator: Thomas A. Hutton

In April 2001, the Peter Wall Institute for Advanced Studies awarded \$15,000 for an exploratory workshop which was held in March 2002 and brought together UBC Asian urban scholars, including graduate students, with leading international service industry specialists (1) to develop a stimulating, interdisciplinary discourse on the three principal consequences of urban service industry growth: (a. new development trajectories, b. changes in urban structure, space and form, c. implications for urban social structure); (2) to establish priorities for new scholarly investigations derived from these analyses and discussions, and (3) to develop a collaborative approach prior to the preparation of a strategic-level grant application. Workshop sessions addressed fundamental research issues pertaining to models of urban services projection networks, new divisions of urban labour, and implications of services growth for spatial models.

This workshop significantly contributed to new knowledge on the role of service industries in processes of urban change within the Asia-Pacific and generated the following outputs:

manuscripts to be included in a new book which will be published by Routledge in 2004, “*Service Industries, Cities and Development Trajectories in the Asia-Pacific*,” co-edited by Peter Daniels (University of Birmingham), Kong Chong Ho (National University of Singapore) and Dr. Tom Hutton

a paper to be published in the January 2004 issue of *Progress in Planning* entitled “Service Industries, Globalization, and Urban Restructuring within the Asia-Pacific: New Development Trajectories and Planning Responses,” (building on research by the principal investigator which was initiated with support from the CIDA-funded Asian Urban Research Network from 1992-1998 and a UBC Hampton Research grant from 2000-2001)

an invitation to the principal investigator to contribute an essay (tentatively entitled *Services and Emerging Economies: the Asia-Pacific Case*) for *The Handbook of Services Industries* which will be edited by Peter Daniels and John Bryson. The collection of essays has been commissioned by the publisher Edward Elgar and will reflect contemporary research and thinking on aspects of the service industries and the service economy.

## **China**

**Canada-China 3×3 University Partnership: Sustainable Water Resources Management in the Beijing-Tianjin Region (SWRM)**

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*Project completed, December 2003*

Project Director: Michael Leaf; Project Coordinator: Donna Yeung

The Sustainable Water Resources Management in the Beijing-Tianjin Region (SWRM) project is a four-year project funded by the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA). Under CIDA's Canada-China Higher Education Program, the project receives funding for research and training involving issues of water pricing, demand, supply, geographic information systems, environmental impact assessment and governance policy.

The project involves seven partner universities, including:

- The University of British Columbia
- The University of Toronto
- McGill University
- The University of Montreal
- Peking University
- Tsinghua (Qinghua) University
- Nankai University

The primary goals of this project are to:

1. Fund graduate student research and technology training,
2. Provide equipment acquisition for research laboratories,
3. Develop workshops to facilitate dialogue between local communities, academics and government agencies, and
4. Make policy recommendations to relevant governing agencies.

In this reporting period, major activities include:

1. Student field research in the Beijing-Tianjin region conducted by 6 Chinese and 6 Canadian graduate students for periods ranging from 2-6 months
  2. Environmental Impact Assessment workshops in Tianjin, China
  3. Strategic Environmental Impact Assessment Training Modules launched in Tianjin
  4. Our annual strategic planning & management meetings
  5. Maintenance of regular administrative systems
  6. CD-Rom Publication Chapters prepared for production
  7. Completed Masters thesis papers by 4 graduate students and 2 PhD students
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### **Community-based Urban Environmental Management in Quanzhou, Fujian, China**

This project was completed in the summer of 2004, with a Summer Field Studio in Quanzhou, China, organized through the University of Washington, and including students and faculty from UW, UBC, National Taiwan University, Southeast University (Nanjing) and Beijing University. This field studio, carried out in June and July, 2004, consisted of two teams, carrying out research and community planning exercises in two sites, an inner city neighbourhood of Quanzhou, and a rapidly urbanizing village on the edge of the city respectively. The project culminated in presentations to a national conference organized in Quanzhou by the Chinese Association of Urban Planners, on “Democratization of the Urban Planning Decision-making Process.”

Project Leaders: Michael Leaf, Daniel Abramson, Tan Ying (Tsinghua University), and Tao Tao (Chinese Academy of Urban Planning and Design) Since November 1999, the Governance and Civil Society Unit of the Ford Foundation’s Beijing Office has provided funding of US\$134,000 to Tsinghua University School of Architecture, the Chinese Academy of Urban Planning and Design (CAUPD) and the UBC Centre for Human Settlements to facilitate engagement between residents of a neighborhood in the city centre of Quanzhou, Fujian Province, China, and the municipal government of that city on issues of neighborhood infrastructure upgrading, self-built housing regulation and historic preservation. Quanzhou, due to its particular history of tight connections with Overseas Chinese communities and its dynamic private-sector economy and property structure, is a classic case of the difficulties facing conventional state-dominated urban management in China. The object of this project is to explore how more active citizen involvement in urban planning and management in the city will not only make regulatory structures more rational and easy to enforce, but will also uncover alternative sources of investment in urban services and improvements. From July 2002 through June 2003, the project supported a study tour by Chinese Academy of Urban Planning and Design staff on community participation in revitalization and preservation study tour in Seattle, Vancouver and Victoria; participation by project consultant and University of Washington faculty member Daniel Abramson in the December 2002 Pacific Rim Participatory Community Design Conference at Hong Kong Polytechnic University (HKPU); and meetings in Quanzhou and Beijing to prepare exhibition and conference on “Democratization of the Urban Planning Decision-making Process” in Quanzhou.

### **Sri Lanka**

#### **Education for Democratic Planning in Sri Lanka**

Project Leaders: Penny Gurstein & Michael Leaf

This five-year capacity building project began in June 1997 with funding of \$750,000 from the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada (AUCC) through the University Partnerships in Cooperation and development Program of CIDA. It aims to contribute to a stable and pluralistic democracy in Sri Lanka by strengthening the community and regional planning system at local government levels. Its goals are to (1) establish a graduate-level community and regional planning program at the University of Peradeniya and undergraduate programs at the Universities of Ruhuna and Jaffna; (2) carry out short-term colloquial programs for practising Sri Lankan planners at the regional, provincial, city, district, divisional and local community levels; (3) offer graduate fellowships to Sri Lankan faculty members to study community and regional planning at UBC; and (4) carry out pilot projects or in depth case studies on community and

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regional planning issues in Sri Lanka. The project was extended from its original end date of March 2002 to allow the completion of the Sri Lankan PhD student.

The "Education for Democratic Planning" project has been successful in a number of activities. These include:

1. *Policy workshops.* The policy workshops brought together the partner universities and practicing planners with the result of *improving communications between these two groups*. The workshops focused on understanding the role of planners in a democratic society as perceived by planners themselves, policy makers, academicians, and community leaders. The policy workshops also tackled the locally relevant issues identified in the needs assessment: regional planning and regional economic development at the University of Ruhuna; participatory planning, sustainable tourism and low income housing at the University of Peradeniya; and post war reconstruction at the University of Jaffna. Understanding the role of planners in a democratic society and focusing on local issues helped the project staff design courses, activities, and methodologies that could eventually be applied to planning programs.

2. *Training/colloquium workshops.* The training/colloquium workshops discussed the locally relevant issues identified in the policy workshops in more detail. These issues were lack of trained social planners, focus on physical planning, and lack of consultation with local community. The workshops provided inputs into the curriculum development process and helped to ensure relevance in the development of planning courses at the Sri Lankan partner universities. The results were *planning courses that are locally relevant and which draw on lessons learned from planning programmes offered at universities in other countries*. This also included the development of pedagogical approaches relevant to the Sri Lankan context.

*Curriculum development workshops and the securing of formal approval for new planning programmes at partner universities.* These aimed towards offering new planning programmes at the three partner universities, including the enhancement of Sri Lankan knowledge of international approaches to planning education and the securing of formal institutional approaches to planning education.

Inviting Canadian planners and planning educationists to the training/colloquium workshops and enrolling three Sri Lankan faculty members to study at SCARP. These activities established and augmented partnerships between UBC and the three Sri Lankan universities including enhancing Sri Lankan knowledge of international approaches to planning education.

As particular success, was that the project raised awareness of planning issues in Sri Lanka. For example, the Jaffna workshop was the first of workshop or conference organized at the University of Jaffna since the war had commenced. Because it brought together academics from throughout Sri Lanka to discuss planning for reconstruction and rehabilitation of war-torn areas, it was considered a very significant event.

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## **Vietnam**

### **Localized Poverty Reduction in Vietnam (LPRV)**

Project Director, Peter Boothroyd: Project Coordinator, Vince Verlaan

In April 2003, the CIDA-funded (1998-2003) Localized Poverty Reduction in Vietnam (LPRV) program, which was scheduled to complete its activities by the end of May 2003, was granted a one-year extension due to the SARS crisis. The overall LPRV approach is to develop at each institution a Centre for Poverty Reduction (CPR) through which participatory methods can be explored with local governments. LPRV activities centre on participatory community-level poverty reduction projects, development of new curricula and learning methods for university students and government officials, and inputs to government policies and programs concerned with hunger eradication and poverty reduction. The lessons learned through all these activities are shared nationally through activities coordinated by the National Centre for Social Sciences and Humanities (NCSSH).
